Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of India Branch of Bank of China Ltd. (the Bank), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2022, the Profit and Loss Account and Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information. (hereinafter referred to as "the financial statements").

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Banking Regulation Act, 1949 as well as Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India and give a true and fair view of the State of Affairs of the Bank as at 31st March, 2022, its profit and its cash flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under sub-section (10) of Section 143 of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the 'Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements' section of our report. We are independent of the Bank in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion on the financial statements.

Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditor's Report Thereon

The Bank's Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Annual Report (including Basel III Pillar 3 disclosures) but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon, which we obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.



In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

The Bank's Management is responsible for the matters stated in sub-section (5) of Section 134 of the Act with respect to preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the Bank in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act to the extent applicable, the provisions of Section 29 of the Banking Regulation Act, 1949, and circulars, guidelines and directions issued by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) from time to time. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the Provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the Bank and for preventing and detecting fraud and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies, making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Bank's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Bank or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Bank's Management is also responsible for overseeing the Bank's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with SAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.



- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances. Under Clause (i) of sub-section (3) of Section 143 of the Act, we are also responsible for expressing our opinion on whether the Bank has internal financial controls with reference to financial statements in place and the operating effectiveness of such controls.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Bank's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Bank to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

Other Matter

The financial statements of the Bank for the year ended 31st March 2021 included in these financial statements, have been audited by the predecessor auditors who expressed an unmodified opinion on those statements on 28th June 2021. Our Opinion on the financial statements is not modified in respect of the above matter.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

1. The Balance Sheet and the Profit and Loss Account have been drawn up in accordance with the provisions of Section 29 of the Banking Regulation Act, 1949 read with Section 133 of the s Act.
2. As required by sub-section (3) of Section 30 of the Baking Regulation Act, 1949, we report that:
 - (a) We have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of our knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of our audit and have found them to be satisfactory;



(b) the transactions of the Bank, which have come to our notice during the course of audit, have been within the powers of the Bank;

(c) The profit and loss account shows a true balance of profit for year then ended.

3. Further, as required by sub-section (3) of section 143 of the Act we report that:

(a) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;

(b) In our opinion, proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Bank so far as it appears from our examination of those books and other supplementary records;

(c) The Balance sheet, Profit and Loss Account and Cash Flow Statement dealt with in this report are in agreement with the books of account;

(d) In our opinion, the aforesaid financial statements comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 to the extent they are not inconsistent with the accounting policies prescribed by RBI.

(e) The requirements of sub section (2) of Section 164 of the Act are not applicable considering that the Bank is a India branch of Bank of China Limited, which is incorporated in China;

(f) With respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls over financial reporting of the Bank and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate Report in 'Annexure A'.

(g) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor's Report in accordance with Rule 11 of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014, in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us:

(a) The Bank does not have any pending litigations which would impact its financial position;

(b) The Bank has not entered into long term contracts including derivative contracts which has material foreseeable losses;

(c) The Bank does not have any amount which was required to be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund.

(d) (i) The Management has represented that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, other than those disclosed in notes to the accounts no fund have been advanced or loaned or invested (either from borrowed funds or share premium or any other sources or kind of funds) by the Bank to or in any other persons or entities, including foreign entities ("Intermediaries"), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Intermediary shall,



- Whether directly or indirectly lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Bank ("Ultimate Beneficiaries") or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries; or
- provide any guarantee, security or the like to or on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries.

(ii) The Management has represented that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, other than as disclosed in the notes to the accounts, no funds (which are either material either individually or in aggregate) have been received by the Bank from any person or entity, including foreign entity ("Funding Parties"), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Bank shall,

- whether directly or indirectly lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever ("Ultimate Beneficiaries") by or on behalf of the Funding Parties or
- provide any guarantee, security or the like from or on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries.

(iii) Based on the audit procedures that have been considered reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances, nothing has come to our notice that has caused us to believe that the representation under sub-clause (i) and (ii) of Rule 11(e), as provided under (a) and (b) above; contain any material misstatement.

(e) The Bank is India branch of Bank of China Limited, which is incorporated in China. As such no dividend can be declared by the Branch.

(h) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor's Report in accordance with the requirements of sub-section (16) of Section 197 of the Act, as amended; the Bank is a Banking Company as defined under Banking Regulation Act, 1949. Accordingly, the requirements prescribed under Section 197 of the Act do not apply.

Report on the internal financial controls with reference to the aforesaid financial statements under Clause (i) of sub-section (3) of Section 143 of the Act

We have audited the internal financial controls with reference to financial statements of Bank of China Limited, India Branch ("the Bank") as of 31st March 2022 in conjunction with our audit of the financial statements of the Bank for the year ended on that date.

Management's Responsibility for Internal Financial Controls

The Bank's Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal financial controls based on the internal control with reference to financial statements criteria established by the Bank considering the essential components of internal control stated in the "Guidance Note on Audit of Internal Financial Controls over Financial Reporting" (the 'Guidance Note') issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI). These responsibilities include the design, implementation and maintenance of internal financial controls that were operating effectively for ensuring the orderly and efficient conduct of its business, including adherence to Bank's policies, the safeguarding of its assets, the prevention and detection of frauds and errors, the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, and the timely preparation of reliable financial information, as required under the Act.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the Bank's internal financial controls with reference to financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with the Guidance Note on Audit of Internal Financial Controls Over Financial Reporting issued by ICAI and the Standards on Auditing, issued by ICAI and deemed to be prescribed under section 143(10) of the Companies Act, 2013, to the extent applicable to an audit of internal financial controls. Those Standards and the Guidance Note require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether adequate internal financial controls with reference to financial statements are established and maintained and if such controls operated effectively in all material respects.

Our audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the existence of the internal financial controls system with reference to financial statements and their operating effectiveness. Our audit of internal financial controls with reference to financial statements included obtaining an understanding of internal financial controls with reference to financial statements, assessing the risk that a material weakness exists, and testing and evaluating the design and operating effectiveness of internal control based on the assessed risk. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion on the Bank's internal financial controls system with reference to financial statements.



Meaning of Internal Financial Controls With Reference to Financial Statements

The Bank's internal financial control with reference to financial statements is a process designed to provide reasonable assurance regarding the reliability of financial reporting and the preparation of financial statements for external purposes in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The Bank's internal financial control with reference to financial statements includes those policies and procedures that-

- i. pertain to the maintenance of records that, in reasonable detail, accurately and fairly reflect the transactions and dispositions of the assets of the Bank;
- ii. provide reasonable assurance that transactions are recorded as necessary to permit preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, and that receipts and expenditures of the Bank are being made only in accordance with authorizations of management of India branch of the Bank; and
- iii. provide reasonable assurance regarding prevention or timely detection of unauthorized acquisition, use, or disposition of the Bank's assets that could have a material effect on the financial statements.

Inherent Limitations of Internal Financial Controls With Reference to Financial Statements

Because of the inherent limitations of internal financial controls with reference to financial statements, including the possibility of collusion or improper management override of controls, material misstatements due to error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projections of any evaluation of the internal financial controls with reference to financial statements to future periods are subject to the risk that the internal financial control with reference to financial statements may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the policies or procedures may deteriorate.

Opinion

In our opinion, to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the Bank has, in all material respects, internal financial controls system with reference to financial statements in existence and such internal financial controls with reference to financial statements were operating effectively as at 31st March 2022, based on the internal control with reference to financial statements criteria established by the Bank considering the essential components of internal control stated in the Guidance Note.

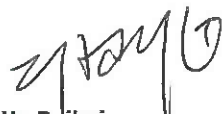

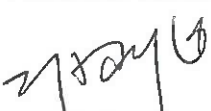

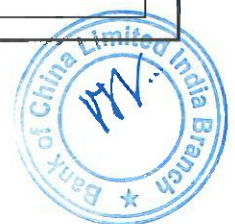

SCHEDULE 17 - Significant Accounting Policies

1. Background:

Bank of China Ltd India Branch ('the Bank') has been granted license by Reserve Bank of India (RBI) to carry on banking business in India on 25th October 2018 and the Bank has commenced its operations from 3rd June 2019. The accompanying financial statements are for the period ended 31st March 2022 comprising of the accounts of India Branch of Bank of China Limited which is incorporated in The People's Republic of China. The bank has only one branch in India as on 31st March 2022 situated in Mumbai. The Bank's name has been included in the Second Schedule to the Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934 vide Notification DBR.IBD. No.10585/23.03.005/2018-19 dated June 19, 2019 and published in the Gazette of India (Part III - Section 4) dated July 27 – August 02, 2019.

2. Basis of Preparation:

The Financial Statements have been prepared on going concern basis in accordance with historical cost convention on accrual basis, except as otherwise stated, and include adjustments that are necessary as the bank is to continue as a going concern, relating to the recoverability & classification of recorded asset amounts or to the amounts & classification of liabilities and comply in all material aspects with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) in India, statutory requirements prescribed under the Banking Regulation Act, 1949, circulars & notifications issued by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) from time to time till date and current practices prevailing within banking industry in the country, notified Accounting Standards specified under section 133 of Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 7 of Companies (Accounting) Rules, 2014 and Companies (Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2021 to the extent applicable and current practices prevailing within the banking industry in India, to the extent applicable and conform to the statutory requirements prescribed under the Banking Regulation Act, 1949. The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees rounded off to the nearest thousand, unless otherwise stated.

3. Use of Estimates:

The preparation of the financial statements, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP), requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) as at the date of financial statements and reported, revenues and expenses for the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. The management believes that the estimates used in the preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Any revision to the accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in the current and future periods.

4. Significant Accounting Policies

4.1 Revenue Recognition:

- Revenue is recognized to the extent that is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the bank and the revenue can be reliably measured.
- Interest Income is accounted on accrual basis, except in the case of non-performing assets where it is recognized, upon realization, as per the prudential norms of RBI.
- Fee for services are recognized at the time the services are rendered and a binding obligation to receive the fees has arisen. Commission on guarantees and letters of credit are recognized over the tenure of the instrument on a constant yield basis.
- Income on discounted instruments is recognized over the tenure of the instrument on a constant yield basis.



4.2 Foreign Exchange Transactions:

- Monetary Assets and Liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the period end exchange rates notified by the Foreign Exchange Dealers' Association of India (FEDAI) and the resultant gains or losses are recognized in Profit and Loss Account.
- Income and expenditure in foreign currencies are translated at the rates prevailing on the date of the transaction.
- Non-monetary items which are carried in terms of historical cost denominated in a foreign currency are reported using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction.
- Contingent liability on account of forward exchange, derivative contracts, guarantees, acceptances, endorsements and other obligations are stated at the closing spot exchange rates notified by FEDAI at the balance sheet date.

4.3 Fixed Assets & Depreciation:

- Fixed Assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation less impairment provision. Cost comprises the purchase price and any attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.
- The Bank capitalizes all costs relating to acquisition and installation of fixed assets. However, fixed assets individually costing less than INR 50,000/- are expensed out in the year of purchase as per Fixed Asset Policy of Bank. The conditions to qualify as Fixed Assets: i) Held for the purpose of rendering services, leasing or operation management ii) The Service life exceeds one fiscal year iii) Having a unit value (excluding ineligible input GST) of more than INR 50,000/- (inclusive).
- The Bank has adopted the life of assets as per Companies Act, 2013. The life for various Fixed Assets are:

- Depreciation on the fixed assets added/disposed off/discarded during the period is provided on pro-rata basis with reference to the month of addition/disposal/discarding.
- No Scrap value has been considered by the management for the purpose of calculation of depreciation on the fixed assets.
- During the year, the bank has revised its previous estimate for expensing out fixed assets costing less than INR 20,000 to INR 50,000 based on ALCO's approval.

4.4 Cash and Cash Equivalents:

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, balances with Reserve Bank of India, balances with other banks and money at call and short notice.

4.5 Employee Benefits:

a) Provident Fund

The Bank contributes an amount equal to the employees' contribution on a monthly basis to the Regional Provident Fund Commissioner (RPFC). The Bank has no liability for future provident fund benefits apart from its monthly contribution which is charged to the Profit and Loss Account.

b) Gratuity

In terms of Accounting Standard 15, liability with regard to gratuity fund is accrued based on actuarial valuation conducted by an independent actuary using the projected unit credit method as at 31st March each year. Actuarial gains and losses are recognized in the Profit and Loss Account in the year in which they arise. The contribution payable/paid is charged to the Profit and Loss Account.



4.6 Taxes on income:

Income tax expense comprises of current tax (i.e. amount of tax for the period, determined in accordance with the Income Tax Act, 1961 and the rules framed there under) and deferred tax charge or credit reflecting the tax effects of timing differences between accounting income and taxable income for the period.

Current tax expense is recognized on an annual basis under the tax payable method based on the estimated liability computed after taking credit for allowances and exemption in accordance with the provisions of Income Tax Act, 1961 and rules framed thereunder.

The Bank accounts for deferred taxes in accordance with the provisions of Accounting Standard 22 - Accounting for Taxes on Income. The deferred tax assets are recognized only to the extent that there is reasonable certainty that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which such deferred tax assets can be realized. In situations where the Bank has unabsorbed depreciation or carry forward tax losses, all deferred tax assets are recognized only if there is virtual certainty supported by convincing evidence that they can be realized against future taxable profits. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

4.7 Operating Lease:

Leases where the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased asset are classified as Operating Leases. Operating Lease payments are recognized as an expense in the Profit and Loss Account on a straight line basis over the lease term accordance with AS-19 Leases.

4.8 Provisions and Contingent liabilities:

A provision is recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of a past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. A disclosure for a contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made. Provisions are reviewed at each Balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the best available estimate. If it is no longer probable that an outflow of resources would be required to settle the obligation, the provision is reversed. General provision on Standard Advances, provision for Country Risk, additional & floating provision and provision for Unhedged Foreign Currency Exposure is made as per guidelines prescribed by RBI and included under 'Other Liabilities and Provisions'.

4.9 Impairment of Assets:

The Bank assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. Impairment loss, if any, are provided in the statement of profit and loss account to the extent the carrying amount of assets exceeds their estimated recoverable amount.

4.10 Investments

Classification

In accordance with Reserve Bank of India ("RBI") guidelines, all investments are categorized as 'Held to Maturity', or 'Held for Trading' or 'Available for Sale'. Under each of these categories, investments are further classified under six groups namely, Government Securities, Other Approved Securities, Shares, Debentures and Bonds, Subsidiaries and / or Joint Ventures and Others.

Investments that Bank intends to hold to maturity are classified as 'Held to Maturity'. Investments that are held for resale within ninety days from date of purchase are classified as 'Held for Trading'. All other investments are classified as 'Available for Sale'. An investment is classified as 'Held to Maturity', 'Available for Sale' or 'Held for Trading' at the time of its purchase.

Valuation

Investments classified as 'Held to Maturity' are carried at their acquisition cost. The premium paid on acquisition of debt instruments, if any is amortized over the period remaining to maturity. Investment classified as 'Available for Sale' and 'Held for Trading' are marked to market at daily basis respectively based on market price of scrip as available from trades / quotes on stock exchanges or in accordance with the rates / prices notified FBIL (Financial Benchmark India Ltd), FIMMDA(Fixed Income Money Market and Derivatives Association) jointly with PDAI(Primary Dealers Association of India).

Investments categorized as 'Available for sale' and 'Held for Trading' categories are revalued at the market price or fair value determined as per Regulatory (Fixed Income Money Market and Derivatives Association of India (FIMMDA/RBI) guidelines, and only the net depreciation for each category is provided for and net appreciation is ignored. On provision of depreciation the book value of the individual securities remains unchanged.

Treasury Bills, being discounted instruments are valued at carrying cost. Discount to the face value of instrument is recognized over remaining period to maturity.

Acquisition Cost

Brokerage, commission etc paid at the time of acquisition of securities are charged to Profit and Loss account. Broken period interest on debt instruments is treated as a revenue item and is accounted for in accordance with RBI guidelines.

Disposal of Investments

Profit/Loss on sale of investments under the aforesaid three categories is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. The profit from sale of investment under HTM category, net of taxes and transfer to statutory reserve is appropriated from Statement of Profit and Loss to Capital Reserve in accordance with RBI Guidelines.

Non Performing Investments

Provision for non-performing investments and investment subjected to prudential norms is made based on periodic review of investment and as per guidelines issued by the RBI. Depreciation on such non-performing investments are not set off against the appreciation in respect of other performing securities. Interest on non-performing investments is not recognized in the Profit & Loss Account until received.

4.11 Advances

Advances are classified as performing and non-performing based on management's periodic internal assessment as per RBI prudential norms. Specific provision for Non-Performing Advances is made on the basis provisioning requirement under prudential norms as laid by the RBI and is deducted from Advances. The Bank also maintains a general loan loss provision on Standard Advances at the rate as prescribed by RBI. General provision on Standard Assets also covers the provision requirement toward un-hedged foreign currency exposure, additional and floating provisions. Provision on Standard Assets, additional & floating provision and Unhedged Foreign Currency Exposure included in Schedule 5 (Other Liabilities and Provisions)

Where there is no longer any realistic prospect of recovery, the outstanding advance is written off.

4.12 Country Risk

The bank follows the guidelines on Country Risk Management in accordance with RBI guidelines and are included in Schedule 5 (Other Liabilities & Provisions) and classification followed by Export Credit Guarantee Corporation of India Ltd. (ECGC) for the purpose of classification and making provisions for country risk exposures. Currently Bank has made provision under low risk category as per ECGC classification.



4.13 Priority Sector Lending Certificates

The Bank enters into transactions for the sale or purchase of Priority Sector Lending Certificates (PSLCs) as per the requirement of RBI.. The fee received for the sale of PSLCs will be is recorded as miscellaneous income and the fee paid for purchase of PSLCs will be is recorded as other expenditure in the Profit and Loss Account.

4.14 Segment Information

The disclosure relating to segment information is in accordance with AS-17, Segment Reporting and as per guidelines issued by RBI.

4.15 Corporate Social Responsibility

Expenditure towards corporate social responsibility are recognized in the Profit & Loss Account

Qualitative disclosure around LCR

The Bank measures and monitors the LCR in line with the Reserve Bank of India's circular dated June 9, 2014 on "Basel III Framework on Liquidity Standards – Liquidity Coverage Ratio (LCR), Liquidity Risk Monitoring Tools and LCR Disclosure Standards". The LCR guidelines aims to ensure that a bank maintains an adequate level of unencumbered High Quality Liquid Assets (HQLAs) that can be converted into cash to meet its liquidity needs for a 30 calendar day time horizon under a significantly severe liquidity stress scenario. At a minimum, the stock of liquid assets should enable the bank to survive until day 30 of the stress scenario, by which time it is assumed that appropriate corrective actions can be taken. Banks are required to maintain High Quality Liquid Assets of a minimum of 100% of its Net Cash Outflows by January 1, 2019. However, with a view to provide transition time, the guidelines mandate a minimum requirement of 60% w.e.f. January 1, 2015 and a step up of 10% every year to reach the minimum requirement of 100% by January 1, 2019.

Banks High Quality Liquid Assets (HQLA) mainly consists of excess CRR balance maintained with RBI, excess of invested in Treasury Bills & Government Securities, Fixed Deposit placement with local bank. Since Bank of China Limited, India is only branch in India all liquidity management is through India branch only done by the Asset Liability Committee. The Bank's capital provides it with adequate liquidity to meet its funding requirements.

The Bank has achieved LCR levels above the minimum stipulated requirement. The daily, monthly and quarterly average LCR results have been achieved on account of excess CRR & SLR portfolio and term deposit placement.

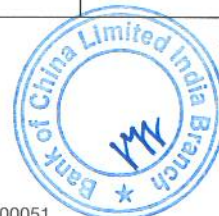

In exceptional cases SBL can also be increased by a further 5% of the capital funds with the approval of the Bank's local executive committee. During the year ended 31 March 2021, no instances of LEF breaches were noted.

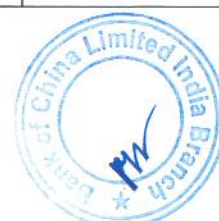
